Course Description:

Level II German focuses on the continued development of communication skills in German and the understanding of culture(s) of countries where German is spoken. Students learn to communicate in real-life contexts about topics that are meaningful to them. Grammar is integrated according to the vocabulary and structure needed in various situations. Technology is used as a tool to access authentic information in German.

Course Outline:

1st 9 weeks Units 7-9

Vocabulary for topics household chores and describing the weather; groceries, weights, and time expressions; giving directions, food, and appetite;

Language skills: modals (müssen, können), separable-prefix (aufräumen), accusative pronouns, referring to past tense modal; (sollen), du and ihr commands, conjunctions (weil, denn), past tense of sein; verb (wissen, fahren), formal commands, using negations with kein, conjunction (dass).

Cultural topics and corresponding vocabulary: environment, freetime activities, specialty shops and markets, weights and measurements, German advertisements.

2nd 9 weeks Units 10-12

Vocabulary for topics: film and books, likes and dislikes, entertainment; telephone vocabulary, holidays and greetings, gift ideas; ingredients, freetime activities, describing clothing, furniture and appliances.

Language skills: verbs (mögen, kennen, sehen, lesen), sprechen and sprechen über, lieber, am liebsten, gern, dative case and word order, verb (können, wissen, wollen, müssen, möchten), preposition du, nominative and accusative pronouns, definite and indefinite articles, noch ein and kein

Cultural topics and corresponding vocabulary: German movie ratings and system, popular novels, pop charts, Saint's days, German good luck symbols, birthdays, Spätzle and Apfelküchen, Imbissstube menus and furniture ads.

CLASS REQUIREMENTS:

Students will come to class prepared and on time with completed homework assignments, textbooks, workbooks, and all other necessary materials. Failure to do so may result in a *retention* or in the lowering of ones participation grade.

Students will be required to **speak German, to the best of their abilities, daily**. There will be projects and oral presentations in German corresponding with the theme for each chapter. **Participation** in class includes being prepared, paying attention, cooperating, volunteering frequently, group work activities; and **speaking German** daily.

Classroom expectations by grade levels: 9th/10th Grades Late Work: Major assignments- lose 1 letter grade the first day, another letter grade the second day. More than two days late, the grade is zero. Minor assignments (homework) lose 1 letter grade for incomplete work and zero for missing completely.

CLASSROOM POLICIES:

I. Materials

1. Sharpened pencils with erasers, blue or black pens for assignments to be turned in and a red pen for correcting homework.
2. Two different colored dry erase markers (low-odor) to use on white practice boards.
3. Loose-leaf binder notebook and a folder designated for foreign language papers and handouts. Loose leaf paper.
4. 3x5 ruled note cards for vocabulary and a fastener (ring, box, plastic sandwich bag) to separate chapter vocabulary.
5. Textbook and workbooks

II. Homework, Quizzes/Tests

1. Homework will be assigned and assessed daily.
2. **No homework will be accepted late for full credit except** in the case of **EXCUSED** absences. With an excused absence, the student will have one day to complete the assignment for every day absent.
3. **It is the student's responsibility to inquire about missed assignments upon returning from an excused absence.**
4. **PLEASE NOTE:** A student may not make up graded work if his/her absence is unexcused.

III. Written Assignments

- 1 All work must be neat and legible.
- 2 Assignments to be turned in should be done in blue or black ink (not red or green) or typed.
3. Use of spiral notebook paper for assignments to be turned in is unacceptable.
4. Proper documentation (See Honor Code)

IV. Student conduct

1. All regulations in the **Student Handbook** apply to this class including **Dress Code, Cell Phones, Music or any other electronic devices, and Food [including gum].**
- 2 **Show respect** for classmates, teachers and their property.
3. Students are to be seated in the classroom when the bell rings and wait to be dismissed by the teacher at the end of class.
4. The German class period is designated for German studies. Assignments for other classes are not to be done during this class period unless specifically given permission to do so.

V. PCHS Honor Code:

The PCHS Honor Code is based on the premise **that PCHS students will not cheat, lie, or steal, nor tolerate those who do.** The following expectations will apply:

Homework Assignments: Students are encouraged to practice what they have learned during class with other students, teachers, parents and tutors as a means of enhancing their learning of German. However, all written work assigned from workbooks, worksheets, textbooks or compositions are to be done independently unless given specific permission to do otherwise.

Tests & Quizzes: All work must be performed individually using only the resources specifically authorized by the teacher for a specific test or quiz.

Dialogs/Cooperative learning: Each student must make original contributions and participate fully when working in a group activity.

Projects/Presentations: Written material acquired from the Internet or any other source must be **properly documented.** Research projects using the Internet must be downloaded onto a disc and turned in along with a printed copy. The disc may be reviewed on TURNITIN.com which will check for plagiarism. I will not accept German- translated materials directly from the Internet unless properly documented. It is expected that you will rewrite it in your own words, either in German or English according to the objectives of the assignment.

VI. Grades: Grades will be **weighted** according to categories. **German Level 2**

Participation=15%; Homework =20%; Quizzes (chapter sections and Tagebuch) = 30%; Performance Based Assessments (chapter tests and oral presentations) =35%. No extra credit work with intention of raising the grade at the end of the grading period will be accepted.

VII. Advancement to German 3

It is strongly recommended for students to have a **79% average at the end of the term** in order to advance to German 2. Qualified German 3 students will have the opportunity to enter the Honors Language Program.

VIII. Extra Curricular Opportunities:

All German students are encouraged to join the **German Club.**
